




HOW IS THE HOT LIST CREATED?



HOTEL LE COUCOU, MERIBEL

The Trois Vallées ski resort of Méribel is better known for rosy-cheeked British families (it's the kind of place where the Middletons are spotted on the slopes) than design cred. Unless chocolate-box twee is recognised as an architectural movement. Which is what makes the piste-side arrival of Le Coucou, a radical take on a chalet from Paris-based interior designer Pierre Yovanovitch that was 18 months in the making, all the more remarkable. Yovanovitch's flair and fastidious attention to detail is evident everywhere, from the polka-dot carpet inspired by falling snow to furniture with a playful sense of form and place: ice-cube-shaped light shades, ski-pole table legs and bouclé chairs with teddy-bear-ear headrests. While at first glance it looks gloriously grown-up, splashed with loosely Seventies colours, look closer and there are plenty of tongue-in-cheek twists, from emoji-themed plates and offbeat cuckoo clocks to a recurrent bird trope that includes owls as well as the titular cuckoos. Silky mashed potato paired with cuts of rare steak is the signature in the Beefbar restaurant, while the Italian bistro Biancaneve serves seductive risotto al tartufo. The third hotel from fledgling French group Maisons Pariente (the first two being Provençal hit Crillon Le Brave and St Tropez's Lou Pinet), also cleverly teams up with toxin-free beauty queen Tata Harper for the spa, which leads to a serene indoor-outdoor pool overlooking the mountains. Proactively familyfriendly, the hotel also has a yeti-themed kids' club plus games room for older teens. A spirited take on the ski lodge and the cuckoo in the nest of cookie-cutter chalets in these parts. By Sophie Butler
